The Falling Away, the Man of Sin, and the Restrainer

Now we beseech you, brethren, by the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ,
and by our gathering together unto Him,
that ye be not soon shaken in mind, or be troubled.

— *2 Thessalonians 2:1–2*

Introduction to the Study



Second Thessalonians chapter 2 moves into the heart of Paul's correction. The church had been troubled by claims that the Day of the Lord had already arrived. Paul does not answer panic with speculation. He answers confusion with ordered truth: the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, our gathering together unto Him, the falling away, the revealing of the man of sin, and the restraint that remains until God's appointed time.

This study focuses especially on verses 1–8. These verses establish the problem, identify the coming rebellion, describe the man of sin, and introduce the mystery of iniquity already at work. They also announce the certainty of Christ's triumph: the lawless one will not endure forever, because the Lord Jesus Himself will consume him with the spirit of His mouth and destroy him with the brightness of His coming.

The purpose of this study is not fear, date-setting, or curiosity about hidden things. The purpose is stability: "Let no man deceive you." God is not losing control of history. His plan is still moving, the gospel is still going to the nations, and the Lord Himself governs the timing of the final unveiling.

Study Focus

- The coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our gathering together unto Him.
- The command: Let no man deceive you by any means.
- The falling away as rebellion or departure from truth, not a pre-tribulation rapture.
- The revealing of the man of sin and son of perdition.
- The distinction between what withholdeth and he who now letteth.
- Isaiah 66 as Old Testament background for the restrainer language.
- Connections to Second Peter, Jude, Revelation, Matthew, Romans, and Second Thessalonians so the prophetic pattern can be seen together.
- The final destruction of the lawless one by the brightness of Christ's coming.

Companion Bible Footnote Helps

The following notes are summarized as study helps from the Companion Bible footnotes and structure. They are included to help the class track key words in the passage without losing the flow of Paul's argument.

Verse	Word / Phrase	Study Note
2:1	coming	The word points to the Lord's personal presence or arrival. Paul connects this coming with the gathering together unto Him.
2:1	gathering together	The expression emphasizes the assembling of the Lord's people unto Him. It belongs with the hope already taught in First Thessalonians 4:13–18.
2:2	shaken / troubled	Paul warns against mental agitation and alarm. Prophetic teaching should stabilize the church, not produce panic.
2:2	spirit / word / letter	False claims may come through spiritual language, spoken teaching, or forged authority. The church must test all claims by apostolic truth.
2:2	day of Christ / day of the Lord	The issue is the Day associated with the Lord's revealed intervention. Paul says the Thessalonians must not believe that the Day had already arrived.
2:3	falling away	Apostasy or revolt: a departure from truth and loyalty. Paul treats this as something that must come before the Day.

Teaching Link

These passages give the serious Bible student a combined view:

- Isaiah 66 shows the Lord coming with fire and gathering the nations;
- Second Peter describes the Day of the Lord with fervent heat;
- Jude announces the Lord coming with His holy ones to execute judgment;
- Revelation shows the beastly deception and the public defeat of the beast;
- Second Thessalonians names the lawless one who is destroyed by the brightness of Christ's coming.

Biblical Observations

Observation 1

2 Thessalonians 2

1 Now we beseech you, brethren,
† by the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ,
† and by our gathering together unto Him,

2 That ye be not soon shaken in mind,
† or be troubled,
† neither by spirit,
† nor by word,
† nor by letter as from us,
† as that the day of Christ is at hand.

- *the coming...and our gathering...* Paul begins with the hope of Christ's return and the gathering of His people. The coming and the gathering belong together. They are not given to frighten the faithful, but to steady them.
- *not soon shaken...* The danger was emotional and doctrinal instability. False claims about prophecy can shake the mind when believers lose contact with the order of Scripture.
- *spirit...word...letter...* Error can come through religious language, persuasive speech, or counterfeit authority. The believer must test claims by the Word, not by intensity or novelty.

Personal Application...

Refuse to let urgency replace discernment. When a claim about prophecy produces confusion, anxiety, or spiritual instability, return first to what Scripture actually says.

Biblical Observations

Observation 2

2 Thessalonians 2

3 Let no man deceive you by any means:

- † for that day shall not come,
- † except there come a falling away first,
- † and that man of sin be revealed,
- † the son of perdition;

- *Let no man deceive you...* Paul does not treat deception as harmless. Confusion about the Day of the Lord can unsettle the church and lead believers away from steadiness.
- *falling away...* The falling away is a revolt or departure from truth. In context, it is not an escape of the church before tribulation. It is rebellion that precedes the Day.
- *man of sin...son of perdition...* The final opponent embodies lawlessness and doomed rebellion. The title points to a person or power of concentrated opposition who is destined for destruction.

Personal Application...

Do not assume every departure from truth begins with open hatred of God. Many apostasies begin with neglect of Scripture, tolerance of deception, or refusal to love the truth.

Biblical Observations

Observation 3

2 Thessalonians

4 Who opposeth

† and exalteth himself above all that is called God,
† or that is worshipped;
† so that he as God sitteth in the temple of God,
† shewing himself that he is God.

- *opposeth and exalteth...* The man of sin does not merely resist God; he exalts himself over everything associated with worship. Lawlessness reaches its height in self-deification.
- *sitteth in the temple of God...* The point is unlawful enthronement and self-display in the place of divine honor. He claims a seat that belongs only to God.
- Isaiah 66:5–6 helps frame this pattern. The enemies mock those who tremble at God's Word, but the Lord answers from the temple and renders recompense to His enemies. Rebellion may speak loudly for a season, but the voice of the Lord has the final word.

Personal Application...

Beware the smaller forms of self-exaltation. The spirit that reaches its climax in the man of sin also appears wherever we resist God's authority and seek glory for ourselves.

Biblical Observations

Observation 4

2 Thessalonians 2

5 Remember ye not,

† that, when I was yet with you,

† I told you these things?

6 And now ye know what withholdeth

† that he might be revealed in his time.

- *Remember...* Paul reminds them that this was not new teaching. They had already received instruction. Sound doctrine must be remembered, not replaced by each new alarm.
- *what withholdeth...* Paul first speaks of an impersonal restraint. Something is presently holding back the revelation of the lawless one until his appointed time.
- *Isaiah 66:18–21* provides a key background. The Lord gathers nations and tongues, sends survivors to the distant coastlands, and declares His glory among the Gentiles. This fits the idea that God's mission to the nations continues before the final Day arrives.
- *Matthew 24:14* and Romans 11:25 reinforce the same pattern: the gospel goes to the nations, and the fullness of the Gentiles comes in before the end reaches its appointed moment.

Personal Application...

Take courage in the patience of God. What feels delayed to us may actually be mercy, mission, and the steady unfolding of His purpose among the nations.

Biblical Observations

Observation 5

2 Thessalonians 2

7 For the mystery of iniquity doth already work:

- † only he who now letteth will let,
- † until he be taken out of the way.

• *mystery of iniquity*... Lawlessness is not only future; it is already working in hidden form. Paul teaches that the final outbreak of rebellion has present roots. The world is not waiting for evil to begin; evil is already active, concealed, developing, and moving toward its final manifestation.

• *what withholdeth*... In verse 6, Paul says:

2 Thessalonians 2:6

And now ye know what withholdeth

† that he might be revealed in his time.

- The wording points first to a restraining thing — the neuter restrainer, the “what.” This can be understood as God’s appointed redemptive plan still unfolding in history, especially the fullness of the Gentiles being realized before the final Day arrives.
- Paul’s point is that the lawless one cannot be revealed until God’s purpose among the nations has reached its appointed fullness. The gospel must continue to go out. The nations must hear. God’s saving purpose is still moving forward.

This connects with:

Romans 11

25 For I would not, brethren,

- † that ye should be ignorant of this mystery,
- † lest ye should be wise in your own conceits;
- † that blindness in part is happened to Israel,
- † until the fulness of the Gentiles be come in.

Matthew 24

14 And this gospel of the kingdom shall be preached in all the world

- † for a witness unto all nations;
- † and then shall the end come.

So, the neuter restrainer — the “what” — is the fullness of the Gentiles being realized within God’s redemptive plan. The final rebellion is held back while God continues gathering from the nations those who will hear, believe, and be saved.

Biblical Observations

Observation 5 *continued*

• *he who now letteth...* In verse 7, Paul shifts from “what withholdeth” to “he who now letteth.” The language moves from the restraining purpose to the personal Restrainer behind it.

The masculine restrainer — the “he” — is God Himself.

This means the restraint is not mechanical, political, accidental, or uncertain. Behind the timing of these final events stands the personal will, authority, and sovereignty of God. The fullness of the Gentiles is the plan being worked out; God Himself is the One governing and restraining until that plan reaches its appointed completion.

Isaiah 66 helps make this connection. The chapter speaks of God gathering the nations, sending survivors to distant peoples, and declaring His glory among the Gentiles.

Isaiah 66:18–19

18 For I know their works and their thoughts:

† it shall come,

† that I will gather all nations and tongues;

† and they shall come,

† and see my glory.

19 And I will set a sign among them,

† and I will send those that escape of them unto the nations,

† to Tarshish, Pul, and Lud,

† that draw the bow,

† to Tubal, and Javan,

† to the isles afar off,

† that have not heard my fame,

† neither have seen my glory;

† and they shall declare my glory among the Gentiles.

This is the mission-to-the-nations pattern. God is still gathering. God is still sending. God is still declaring His glory among the Gentiles.

Isaiah 66:7–9 also emphasizes that God controls the moment of birth:

Isaiah 66:9

Shall I bring to the birth,

† and not cause to bring forth?

† saith the LORD:

† shall I cause to bring forth,

† and shut the womb?

† saith thy God.

Biblical Observations

Observation 5 *continued*

This also connects with Jesus' own words:

Matthew 24:36

But of that day and hour knoweth no man,

† no, not the angels of heaven,

† but my Father only.

The Father alone knows the day and hour because the Father governs the timing. The restraint remains until the Father's purpose is complete. The fullness of the Gentiles must come in. Then, and only then, the restraint is removed, the lawless one is revealed, and the Lord Jesus destroys him by the brightness of His coming.

• until he be taken out of the way... This does not mean God loses control or is removed in weakness. It means the restraining action is lifted according to God's sovereign timing. The lawless one is revealed only when God permits it — and even then, his revealing is short-lived and doomed.

2 Thessalonians 2:8

And then shall that Wicked be revealed,

† whom the Lord shall consume with the spirit of His mouth,

† and shall destroy with the brightness of His coming.

The order is important:

- the mystery of iniquity is already working
- the fullness of the Gentiles is still being realized
- God Himself restrains until the appointed time
- the Father alone knows the day and hour
- the lawless one is revealed only when permitted
- Christ destroys him by the brightness of His coming

Personal Application...

Do not mistake delay for disorder. The same Lord who permits time is also the Lord who governs time. Evil may be working, but it is not ruling. God is still gathering, restraining, warning, saving, and preparing His people to stand.

Biblical Observations

Observation 6

2 Thessalonians

8 And then shall that Wicked be revealed,

† whom the Lord shall consume with the spirit of His mouth,

† and shall destroy with the brightness of His coming:

- *then shall that Wicked be revealed...* The lawless one is unveiled, but only under God's timing and only for judgment. His revealing is not victory; it is the beginning of his end.
- *consume with the spirit of His mouth...* Christ's victory comes by His own authority. Isaiah 11:4 and Revelation 19:15 use similar mouth/sword imagery to describe Messiah's judgment.
- *brightness of His coming...* The KJV phrase captures the overwhelming majesty of the appearing. The Lord's revealed glory destroys the lawless one. This connects with Isaiah 66:15–16, Second Peter 3:10 and 12, Jude 14–15, and Revelation 19:11–20.
- Revelation 13 shows beastly deception through signs and wonders; Revelation 19 shows the beast overthrown at the coming of the King of kings. Second Thessalonians 2 supplies the same pattern: deception for a season, destruction at Christ's appearing.

Personal Application...

The church should never fear the final outcome. However strong deception may appear, it remains temporary. Christ's appearing will end what man cannot solve.

Biblical Observations

Observation 7

2 Thessalonians

9 Even him, whose coming is after the working of Satan

† with all power

† and signs

† and lying wonders,

10 And with all deceivableness of unrighteousness

† in them that perish;

† because they received not the love of the truth,

† that they might be saved.

11 And for this cause God shall send them strong delusion,

† that they should believe a lie:

12 That they all might be damned

† who believed not the truth,

† but had pleasure in unrighteousness.

- *after the working of Satan...* The lawless one's coming is energized by satanic power. Signs and wonders do not automatically prove truth. Revelation 13:13–14 shows miracle-working deception in the presence of the beast.
- *received not the love of the truth...* The issue is not lack of religious activity, but refusal to love truth. Deception gains power where truth is not loved.
- *strong delusion...* Judgment can include God handing people over to the lie they prefer. This is a fearful warning against delighting in unrighteousness.

Personal Application...

Pray not only to know truth but to love truth. Ask God to make your heart resistant to deception because it is loyal to His Word.

Biblical Observations

Observation 8

2 Thessalonians 2

13 But we are bound to give thanks alway to God for you,

† brethren beloved of the Lord,

† because God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation

† through sanctification of the Spirit

† and belief of the truth:

14 Whereunto He called you by our gospel,

† to the obtaining of the glory

† of our Lord Jesus Christ.

15 Therefore, brethren, stand fast,

† and hold the traditions

† which ye have been taught,

† whether by word,

† or our epistle.

16 Now our Lord Jesus Christ Himself,

† and God, even our Father,

† which hath loved us,

† and hath given us everlasting consolation

† and good hope through grace,

17 Comfort your hearts,

- *beloved of the Lord...* After describing deception and judgment, Paul turns to thanksgiving. The saints are not defined by panic but by God's love, sanctification, and truth.
- *stand fast...* The answer to deception is not speculation. It is steadfastness in apostolic teaching. The church stands by holding what has been delivered through the Word.
- *comfort your hearts...* Prophecy should produce comfort, courage, and establishment in good word and work.

Personal Application...

Let this chapter move you from fear to steadfastness. Hold fast to the Word, love the truth, and keep doing good while God's plan unfolds.

Chapter 2 Review

Summary

Second Thessalonians chapter 2 teaches that believers must not be shaken by false claims about the Day of the Lord. Paul anchors the church in ordered truth: the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, the gathering of His people, the falling away, the revealing of the man of sin, and the restraint that remains until the appointed time.

The restrainer language points to God's control over history. The impersonal "what withholdeth" is connected in this study with God's ongoing plan among the nations, while the personal "he who now letteth" points to the Lord Himself governing the timing. Isaiah 66 helps students see this pattern: God gathers the nations, sends witnesses to the coastlands, comes with fire, renders recompense, and brings His purpose to birth in His time.

The chapter also shows that the lawless one is temporary. His deception may be powerful, but his end is certain. The Lord Jesus will consume him with the spirit of His mouth and destroy him with the brightness of His coming.

Key Movements in the Text

- 2:1–2 — Paul corrects alarm concerning the coming and gathering.
- 2:3–4 — The falling away and man of sin must come first.
- 2:5 — Paul reminds them this was already taught.
- 2:6 — What withholdeth restrains the revealing until the appointed time.
- 2:7 — He who now letteth restrains until God's timing is complete.
- 2:8 — The lawless one is destroyed by the brightness of Christ's coming.
- 2:9–12 — Satanic deception overtakes those who refuse the love of the truth.
- 2:13–17 — Believers are called to salvation, truth, steadfastness, comfort, and good works.

- Where am I most likely to be shaken by fear, rumor, or false claims?
- Do I love the truth enough to test what I hear by Scripture?
- How does God's restraint and timing encourage me to trust Him more deeply?
- What does Isaiah 66 add to my understanding of God's plan for the nations?
- How does the certainty of Christ's victory strengthen my endurance today?
- What good word or work should I continue while I wait for the Lord?
