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From Rabbi Cutler's desk

This year don't read the book of Esther! If you come to synagogue Monday night, March 9, 6:30 PM at Keshar Israel (joint celebration), I suggest that you listen but not too carefully. The Book of Esther is not for the faint of heart or the overly sensitive. It's a nasty book filled with sex, violence and inebriation. Its characters are drunks, anti-Semites, or assimilated Jews. In other words, it's probably the one book in the Bible that most closely resembles the world in which we live!



I'm told that there are people in Israel so offended by the story of Esther that they manage to avoid the holiday by always being in a city that is not celebrating Purim. This is possible because Purim is celebrated on the fourteenth of Adar in Tel Aviv and on the fifteenth of Adar in Jerusalem. As a result, one can spend the fourteenth of Adar in Jerusalem, and then just before nightfall, jump in one's car, drive to Tel Aviv and spend the fifteenth of Adar there. In that way, you're never in a place where one is obligated to listen to the Megillah! Of course, it is also possible to spend the fourteenth in Tel Aviv and the fifteenth in Jerusalem, thus celebrating Purim for two days instead of one!

Children love the Megillah, but that is only because they are not paying attention to the story that is being told. This is the one time of year they can make as much noise in synagogue as they want. Haman is a mean old man and, in the end, he gets his comeuppance. But we never really tell them the whole story. And we never admit that too often throughout history Haman has succeeded in punishing our people.

Megillat Esther is a book about powerlessness. All Mordechai can do is stand outside the palace gate and report everything back to his niece Esther. And all Esther can do is enter the King's presence and hope he doesn't chop off her head. In the end, everything works out but we are left to wonder whether that will be the case the next time around.

Esther and Mordechai succeed in foiling Haman's evil plot to destroy the thriving Jewish communities of ancient Persia. As leaders of their community they ordain the Festival of Purim as an annual commemoration of this great deliverance. The events leading up to Purim are recorded in the Book of Esther (the Megillah), the unique Biblical book that does not include God's name or make specific reference to Him.

The serious question of individual destiny is captured in Mordechai's sharp response to Esther when she asserts that she dares not approach the king without being specifically summoned. "Do not imagine that you, of all the Jews, will escape with your life by being in the king's palace. On the contrary, if you keep silent this crisis, relief and deliverance will come to the Jews from another source... While you and your father's house will perish. And who knows, perhaps you have attained to Royal position for just such a crisis." (Esther 4:13.14)

Esther is a violent book. Not only does Haman threaten to kill all the Jews but in the end Mordechai hangs Haman, his ten sons, and then the Jews rise up in self-defense and kill hundreds of people in Shushan and throughout Persia. In fact, it is the only book in the Bible that speaks of people forcibly converting others to their religion!

And where is God in all of this? God is completely absent from the Megillah. It is the only book of the Bible in which God does not appear. What happens is coincidence, or maybe just dumb luck. Who are the heroes of Purim? Two assimilated Jews whose names are borrowed from the pantheon of Persian gods. Mordechai and Esther might as well be named Christian and Christina.

SO PLEASE, DON'T READ MEGILLAT ESTHER! Stop up your ears, talk to your neighbor, or just get so drunk that you can't tell the difference between blessed be Mordechai and cursed be Haman. We think Purim is loads of fun. But truthfully, it is the darkest and most depressing holiday in the Jewish calendar.

But if you insist on reading the Megillah, if I have made you a little curious this morning, then I suggest that you consider the following five questions as you read the Megillah for yourself:

1. What does it mean to speak of God's hiddenness? Is God hidden in today's world?
2. How do we deal with assimilation in the world today?
3. Are we constantly replaying the story of Purim in our own lives? Is anti-Semitism a fact of life that will never go away?
4. Are we perennial outsiders in the world at large, even when the daughter of the president is a Jew?
5. Now that we have a Jewish homeland, how has our status in the world changed? What does it mean to have power?

Well, there you have it. You've been warned. Answering these questions may be just as dangerous as reading the Megillah. They may be just as dangerous as living in a topsy turvy world in which the answer to guns is more guns, the answer to hate is more hate, a world in which we would rather drink ourselves into oblivion than address the issues facing us with thoughtfulness and reason. But the ultimate lesson is we have the power, just as Esther, to change the course of history given the right circumstances and making the right choices.

Religious School Chai-lights

Purim has, as we know, a frightening story; the Jews face a serious threat from a man in power who has great hatred towards them. *Megilat Esther* (the Book of Esther), tells in great detail about this hate and Haman's plans to kill the entire Jewish community of Persia. They are saved through the action of a great hero, Queen Esther, who risks her own life to save them.

But wait - Purim is *not* serious. Of all the Jewish holidays, Purim is the holiday that is the most fun for everyone, especially children. There are carnivals, costumes, masks, a king and a queen, a villain with a funny hat, a brave uncle, and a castle, and its foods are all desserts! It is one of the times where being noisy in synagogue is encouraged. What more could a child want? Its story and costumes are not meant to frighten but to entertain; it is Aladdin with a Jewish twist.

But as we think of Purim, we are reminded that like some other stories of our holidays, it is a story of hatred and violence. As educators, we walk a tight rope, continually exploring a way to tell our stories, but in a way that still protects and shelters children. As adults, we are aware of Jewish history and how difficult it has often been for Jews to live in harmony with their non-Jewish neighbors. We do not want young children to feel that it is not safe to be Jewish.

How do we tell the story? Can it be Purim without the story?

We want to shelter children from harsh truths of life and of the detail in some stories of the Jewish people. How much do young children need to know? As educators, we know that there will be a time in the future when children are developmentally ready to hear and understand a more detailed telling of these stories. But what is it that we *DO* want them to know now?

We want children to know that:

- ✧ Esther was a hero. Girls are heroes – even girls in frilly dresses. She is a model of courage and grace, intelligence, resourcefulness, and modesty. Esther teaches even in the most difficult of times, we can do the right thing.
- ✧ Holidays can be joyous and that together – as a community – we are stronger and can vanquish evil.
- ✧ Good triumphs over bad. In this story, Haman is the vehicle that helps us. He tried to hurt with cruel words and lies but did not win. This is a comforting lesson today and one that can give children some security.

A gentle telling of the story tailored to children's ages and stages is appropriate. A thoughtful approach to Purim allows us to protect our children and ourselves. We all have difficult days. Purim tells us it is okay to be happy. Fun, laughter, and imagination are important and to be celebrated. The winter is ending, and spring will come. Purim celebrates life. Tragedy serves as a reminder of bad and good, of sorrow and of joy... and even more importantly, that as a community, we share it all.

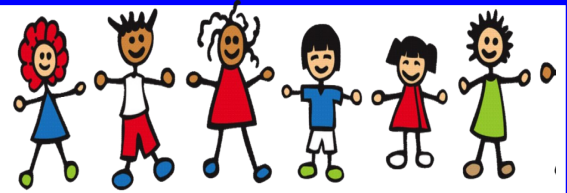

SISTERHOOD

"The History of Hamantaschen" by Matt Blitz (Excerpted and embellished from *Food and Wine Magazine* by Maxine Endy)



Every 14th day of Adar on the Hebrew calendar Jewish people celebrate Purim. It's a joyous holiday that marks the time the Persian Jewish population was saved from genocide. Leave it to the Jews to celebrate and make this a fun celebration of survival. Eating Hamantaschen is one of the things we do on Purim. Our Sisterhood makes delicious treats, so do try them.

It's a long-held belief that the three corners of the triangle-shaped hamantaschen represent Haman's favorite three-cornered hat. Supposedly, taking a bite out of the cookie is in defiance of bowing down to Haman and preventing him from carrying out his evil plan. Further research, though, reveals that the hamantaschen wasn't about Haman's hat at all. It was all about another type of cookie... the "ozen Haman" - actually a completely different pastry. According to haaretz.com, the first written reference to these rounded deep fried cookies dipped in honey come from a 16th century comedy play. Others have translated "ozen Haman" to mean "Haman's ears," a reference to King Ahasuerus cutting off Haman's ears prior to having him hung. While "ozen" can mean ears, chabad.org points out that "oznayim" was often used in Eastern European cultures to describe pastries in general. It also noted that there's no biblical record of the King cutting off Haman's ears, but rather this was a practice more common during the Middle Ages.

The hamantaschen actually did not emerge in Jewish culture until much later, perhaps as recently as the beginning of the 19th century with the "Mohntaschen," or "poppy pocket," a folded, triangle, doughy cookie filled with poppy seed pastes eaten by all sects of the population. The Jewish people's preponderance to eat pastries on Purim and the word "mohn" sort of sounds like Haman. Many scholars believe this is how the word "hamantaschen" came to be. Today, hamantaschen can be found filled with fruit, nuts, chocolate as well as the more traditional "mohn," or poppy seed paste. This Purim, try a hamantaschen, especially one baked by Sisterhood; but remember, it has nothing to do with a hat or severed ears.

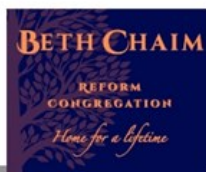

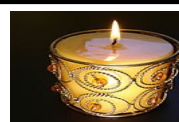
