Thomas Washington Moy, Sr. was born through the union of Elberton Moy and Sylvia Wade on February 6, 1927, in Monroe, Louisiana. His Siblings, Marguerite, Victor, Elberton, Jr., Pernell, Melvin, Zollie, and George, preceded him in death.

Early in life, Tommy followed the pattern of his parents and accepted Christ as the center of his life at St. Stephen A.M.E. church. He received an honorable discharge from the U. S. Army in 1945. Tommy met Gwendolyn Smitherman and asked for her hand in marriage in 1947. To that union three children were born, Thomas W. Moy, Jr. (affectionately known as Sandy), Deborah Nancy and Jeffrey Theodore. Jeffrey preceded his father in death. Tommy later married Marie Parrish in 1954. No children were born to this union. Marie and Gwendolyn preceded Tommy in death.

Tommy believed in being educated. He graduated from Pershing High School, studied for two years at Highland Park Junior College; and earned his Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry at Berkeley University of California.

Tommy was employed from 1957 to 1961 by Wayne County General Hospital as a research technician in the Department of Medicine where he documented and wrote numerous publications.

He later was employed at the Wayne County Morgue in Detroit, MI as a Toxicologist in the Office of Medical Examiners of Wayne County Morgue. He also received honorable certificates of achievements as a Chemist in the EPMU5 Department of the U.S. Navy. He later moved to Las Vegas where he worked for the Environment Protection Agency until he became ill and retired. He also had his own cleaning business and worked for the University of Las Vegas.

Tommy enjoyed spending time with the grands while he lived in Detroit and had the grands stay overnight on occasional weekends, went on picnics and other entertaining activities children enjoy.

Tommy and his wife Marie moved to Las Vegas, Nevada around the year 1992 where they spent their retirement years. Marie and Tommy loved traveling, and they traveled about frequently. Tommy's greatest pastime was spending time with his family and photography. Before they moved out of state, you knew he would be calling early Saturday morning letting us know he would be making his rounds and we knew he would have his camera. If the camera was not in his hand when he came in, you could count on it being in his car.

Tommy made his transition on Sunday, February 11, 2018. He loved his family dearly and will be missed by many, especially Thomas Jr. (Christyne); Deborah Nancy, grandchildren Lisa, Sandy, Jeffery, Stevie and Lance, 15 great-grandchildren, 4 great-great-grandchildren and a host of nephews, nieces, cousins, and friends.
